In 2020, a group of Indigenous and non-Indigenous scholars wrote a paper outlining 10 calls to action for natural scientists. The paper was founded in frustration, friendship and hope. The calls were developed to facilitate reconciliation, rebalance relationships between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Canadians, to tell this part of Canadian history and to create a path forward based on mutual respect. The reality is, you don't do anything in this life without somebody else's assistance, somebody else's ability, somebody else's know-how.... Something that you may put words to is never founded only on your understanding. It's based on a multitude of people that have been walking ahead of you.

The Documentary


